Q&A WITH JEFF PRATT, VCPWA DIRECTOR



This year, the theme of Public Works Week is "*Public Works Connects Us*," how does that play a part of VCPWA's mission to promote best practices in Ventura County?

Here in Ventura County, we are all connected to one another, and to other areas as well, through our system of roads, pipes and waterways. When considering our best practices, we need to remember that what we do affects the world far beyond our county border, as far as wastewater treatment or environmentally-friendly building materials. We also are focused on stronger connections between the five parts of our agency so we can function more efficiently as a whole.

Public Works Day is an exciting opportunity for our local STEM (science, technology, engineering and mathematics) students to learn about Public Works career opportunities. What piece of advice can you offer our local youth who want to pursue a career in this industry?

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It's important for STEM students to be exposed to different things that may interest them, in many different fields. There are a lot of professions, careers and jobs that require STEM skills, including Public Works, and they need to investigate to figure out where their passion lies. I would also advise students to embrace diversity. The STEM fields will truly benefit from increasing participation by minorities and women in future years. Stick with it, and encourage one another.

As more people move to our community, what does that mean for the future of VCPWA?

Added population always increases the demand on our infrastructure, requiring addition to water treatment facilities, road improvements, and expanded sanitation services. We also partner with other agencies to facilitate expansion, such as the construction of a new fire station or medical office. The future will bring many additional challenges, and further underscores the need for us to work together as a community to make the most of our resources.

As 2017 sets in and 2018 is on the horizon, what is your vision for VCPWA and Ventura County?



The future will be a time of change for us, regarding our people, our culture, and our evolving processes. As Ventura County has grown, we have gone from a mostly rural area into a mixture of rural, urban and suburban, and our population continues to increase. All five departments within the VCPWA depend on one another in order to function their best, and so my vision for this year and the next is to strengthen the bridges between departments so we can continue our success as a regional and statewide leader in public works services.

It's important for the community at large to understand the importance of Public Works; what role can our community play with VCPWA to maintain its outstanding leadership in Southern California? Our community is an important part of the VCPWA's success, and we believe the key to community support for Public Works is encouraging interactivity. For example, we have our Public Works Awareness Day each year with activities for children and adults, demonstrations, and career information. Our staff regularly visits schools and other organizations for educational opportunities. Our agency works to be accessible to our community members, and we encourage anyone with questions or comments to contact us.
