Boater Cards Required by Next Month; Boating Green Required Always

Starting January 1, 2018, many boaters in California will be required to have a California Boater Card. The requirement, phased in by age category, applies to operation of any motorized vessel on state waterways, so this includes powered sailboats, but not conventional kayaks, for example.

The first group required to obtain the California Boater Card are recreational boaters 20 years of age and younger. Each year, a new age group will be included in the requirement. By 2025, all persons who operate a motorized vessel on California waters will be required to have a card. The card, issued by the California State Parks Division of Boating and Waterways indicates a boater has taken a class and passed an approved safety education examination.

Courses may be taken in a classroom or online. The current list of approved courses can be found at http://californiaboatercard.com/courses/. The cost of the card will be \$10, and all the money goes toward developing and operating the program. Cards do not expire, distinguishing them from a license.

The boater education course covers not just safety for the boater, but also safety for the environment. One key element of the educational program informs boaters about pumpout stations. As stated on the web site of the California Division of Boating and Waterways, "Pollutants that may be associated with boating activities include sewage, oil and fuel, detergents, solvents, paints, plastics and other marine debris. Given the large number of recreational boats in the state, even a small amount of pollution from a fraction of the boats can cause serious harm to marine fish and wildlife."

"Our playground, their world" is a phrase often used to describe concern about pollution from recreational boating.

In addition, you can download a free App available in Google Play or the App Store called the "Pumpout Nav." This App will help you to find the closest operational sewage Pumpout Station for your boat, learn how to use the pumpout to empty your holding tank, and report non-functional units.

In Ventura County, pump out locations for the Channel Islands Harbor and Ventura Harbor are all free and can be seen at http://www.dbw.ca.gov/?page id=28771#Ventura

An additional pump out station, at Sea Bridge Harbor, is also free.

For the Channel Islands Harbor, pump out facilities are located at both of the guest docks and are maintained by the County of Ventura.

Notes

The SAVE program combines the Abandoned Watercraft Abatement Fund (AWAF) and the Vessel Turn-In Program (VTIP) grants into one, allowing local public agencies the convenience of only one grant to apply for and manage, and the flexibility to use the funds for both purposes as needed.

EFFECTIVE AS OF JANUARY 1, 2016, only the SAVE will be available to public agencies interested in receiving an AWAF and/or VTIP Grant. The SAVE is a competitive grant. Agencies are required to participate in both services under the SAVE.

The AWAF and VTIP are grant programs designed to remove, reduce and prevent abandoned **recreational** vessels and marine debris. Administered by the California State Parks Division of Boating and Waterways (DBW), grants are awarded annually to qualified local public agencies statewide. The AWAF and VTIP, enacted in 1998 and 2010 respectively, have provided millions of dollars in grants, and have enabled the removal of thousands of vessels and marine debris.
